Technology Subcommittee Update

Welcome to the January 2025 Tobacco Uniformity meeting in San Antonio, Texas! We are Raymond Chu, Senior Tax Manager at Core-Mark, and Isa Momoh, Information Systems Manager at the North Carolina Department of Revenue, Excise Tax Division. Ray, the industry co-chair, brings a wealth of tobacco tax knowledge, while Isa complements this with her extensive technical expertise. We are proud of the successful partnership we have developed in a short time, which is crucial for the effective and efficient work of the Technology Subcommittee.

During this meeting, our subcommittee will explore the journey toward successful tobacco uniformity and discuss strategies to guide you along this path. We will connect with individuals who have achieved uniformity, gaining valuable insights into the steps they took before, during, and after the transition. Our presentation will cover various topics, including the process of requesting and obtaining schema approval, implementing subsequent actions, and learning from their overall journey toward uniformity.

Schema Approval Process:

- 1. Submission: States submit their proposed schemas for review.
- 2. Validation: Schemas are validated against the FTA E-Standards to ensure compliance.
- 3. Feedback Loop: Iterative feedback is provided to address any discrepancies or improvements.
- 4. Final Approval: Once all criteria are met, the schema is approved and published.

Implementation Steps:

- 1. Integration Testing: Ensuring the new schema integrates seamlessly with existing systems.
- 2. Data Migration: Transitioning existing data to the new schema format.
- 3. User Training: Conducting training sessions for state personnel on the new system.
- 4. Go-Live Support: Providing support during the initial phase of implementation to address any issues.

Lessons Learned:

- 1. Stakeholder Engagement: Early and continuous engagement with all stakeholders is crucial.
- 2. Documentation: Comprehensive documentation of the schema and implementation process aids in smoother transitions.
- 3. Flexibility: Being adaptable to changes and feedback ensures a more robust system.

Last year, we successfully worked with Iowa and Illinois to review and approve their state schemas in time for their transition to uniform tobacco electronic filing systems. For Illinois, we also collaborated with them and E-Standards to include a cover page in the master tobacco schema. We are pleased to report that FTA E-Standards approved the change, and in July 2024, they published a revised tobacco schema, TobaccoV2.0, available on the FTA Tobacco page.

Additionally, we are excited to share Kansas have all expressed serious interest in tobacco uniformity. Conversations have begun with Kansas, with meetings in October 2024 and January 2025, and we hope to provide more details soon with the other states (Utah, Arizona, Nebraska, and Pennsylvania) that have expressed interest. We are also actively updating the implementation guide and hope to have that reviewed and updated on the FTA Tobacco Tax Section website.

We eagerly anticipate your active participation in this meeting. Your presence and contributions will undoubtedly enhance our collective efforts as we work toward the goals of the Uniformity Committee.

Cannabis Subcommittee Update

DEA's Proposed Rescheduling of Cannabis: A Game-Changer for the Industry

In April 2024, the DEA proposed rescheduling cannabis from a Schedule I to a Schedule III drug under the Controlled Substances Act, recognizing its accepted medical use and lower potential for abuse. Despite recent delays in hearings due to appeals and procedural issues, this change is a game-changer for the industry. It will allow cannabis businesses to take standard tax deductions, easing financial burdens, and enhance medical research, leading to new discoveries and products. Improved access to banking services will provide stability and growth opportunities. While not full legalization, this move sets the stage for more consistent federal oversight and potential interstate commerce, making it easier for cannabis businesses to operate, expand, and innovate.
